Important Election Dates

October 20, 2008 - Last day to register to vote

October 28, 2008 - Last day to request absentee ballot

November 4, 2008 - Voting Day at the polls! Absentee ballots due before 8 p.m. at any polling place or at the Registrar of Voters

Eligibility

You can vote in the Nov. 4, 2008 California General Election if you registered by October 20 and you are:

- ♦ A U.S. citizen
- ♦ Currently residing in California
- ♦ At least 18 years of age on or before November 4
- ♦ Not declared mentally incompetent by court action
- ♦ Not in state or federal prison or on parole. If you are in county jail awaiting court or are awaiting transition to state or federal prison, **you can vote!**

Complaints

For information about problems voting or other complaints, visit our website at www.aclusandiego.org and click on the "Your Voting Rights" icon.



- ♦ You have the **right to cast a ballot** if you are a valid registered voter.
- ♦ You have the **right to cast a provisional ballot** if your name is not listed on the voting rolls.
- ♦ You have the **right to cast a ballot** if you are present and in line at the **polling place** prior to the close of the polls.
- ♦ You have the **right to cast a secret ballot** free from intimidation
- ♦ You have the **right to receive a new ballot** if, prior to casting your ballot, you believe you made a mistake.
- ♦ You have the **right to return a completed vote by mail ballot** to any precinct in the county.
- ♦ You have the **right to election materials in another language**, if there are sufficient residents in your precinct to warrant production.
- ♦ You have the **right to report any illegal or fraudulent activity** to a local elections official or to the Secretary of State's office.

Recommendations for California Ballot Initiatives



No on Prop 4

Limits access to safe, quality medical care for minors by requiring parental notification for teen seeking an abortion.



Yes on Prop 5

Would reduce the number of nonviolent people unnecessarily incarcerated by providing a comprehensive model for approaching substance abuse as a public health issue.



No on Prop 6

Would sentence youth as young as 14 as adults; would erode civil liberties and target communities of color, immigrants, and low-income families while redirecting vital state resources away from schools, hospitals, and emergency services.



No on Prop 8

Eliminates the right of same-sex couples to marry, amending California's Constitution to single out one group of people for different treatment.



No on Prop 9

Erodes due process protections and limits inmate rights to legal representation and parole while hiding behind the guise of expanding victims' rights.
